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Chincoteague Pleads Its Case in Washington

If "Misty" is the magic word you use to make people identify your geographical location, you might be from the Eastern Shore of Virginia. If you feel like a government agency is trying to mess with your ponies, parking or power, you might be a local resident with a fight.

Residents and officials watched a battle via the Internet last Friday. At stake are parking places at Assateague Beach, a destination that attracts tourists and provides recreation for local folks. The conflict also could affect the herd size of famous wild ponies, another visitor attraction. The latter, owned by Chincoteague Fire Company, raises funds for fire and rescue equipment and services instead of taxing property owners.

The controversy over spending federal dollars to rebuild parking spaces that get washed out in storms isn't new. The roads and spots have seen the surf before. But this time, allegations are getting particularly ugly and lines are being drawn in the sand.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS), which makes policy for Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge, secretly applied for and obtained a \$1.5 million grant to purchase land on Chincoteague for parking. Its lack of transparency has led to suspicion.

An FWS representative told a House of Representatives National Resources subcommittee Friday that its only option is to purchase Maddox Family Campground on Chincoteague and that parking there would serve as an overflow or emergency. "We believe it to be a long-time insurance policy," said Wendi Weber.

Local officials aren't buying the explanation. They can see the transit buses coming up the causeway. They

call it a violation of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), which basically "establishes national environmental policy and goals for the protection, maintenance, and enhancement of the environment and provides a process for implementing these goals within the federal agencies."

They also view the parking strategy as the first step in "eventually removing human beings off the beach."

"It's clear the goal of the federal government is to make sure no one can drive to the beach," said Rep. Andy Harris of Maryland. He complained that the cost to fix the 960 parking places amounts to 50 cents per person per visit. "Give the visitors the choice ... people want to enjoy the beach ... we should be encouraging economic activity." Harris repeatedly brow-beat an FWS employee who did not have some answers he was looking for readily available.

"I am here today to tell you that I feel we are being railroaded into less or no parking at the beach and forced to ride a trolley system in the future," said Mayor Jack Tarr. He referred to a slide presentation made by Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge Manager Lou Hinds that started with a crowded roadway going to the beach. "And his comment was, 'The American people have become too dependent on their vehicles,'" Tarr said.

"Every time we suggest how the plan that provides 1.5 million visitors a year and the #1 Beach Town in 2011 could be improved, we are told that it is 'against our policy,'" the mayor continued. "Sand fencing to prevent beach erosion ... Christmas trees to prevent beach erosion ... dune maintenance and planting ... beach nourishment 'against our pol-

icy.' The \$7.5 million that is proposed for a mass transit parking lot would go a long way to take care of the visitor facilities that we already have ... Chincoteague is under siege by the FWS. Their policy of implementing transit in parks and purchasing property in our town limits ... will kill jobs, crush investment and create economic uncertainty in our town."

"You will hear from the government that they have bent over backwards to hold public meetings and have invited stakeholders to meet on many occa-

sions," said Supervisor Wanda Thornton. "This is true. But what is also true is that our concerns have been ignored, we have been lied to, we have been told that no matter what we say the refuge manager has 51 percent of the vote."

"Chincoteague (people) are fearful for their jobs, they are fearful that their investments in local businesses or restaurants may be wiped out because a local refuge manager wants to shut down the current ocean-accessible beach and force tourists to ride into the

Sgt. Michelle Anaya of the State Police said William (Billy) H. Richardson, 51, was driving a 1993 Ford Mustang at about 2:40 p.m. when he "ran off

the road right, struck a drain pipe and then hit a tree."

Richardson was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected from the vehicle. The crash occurred in the 1400 block of Wachapreague Road, Anaya said.

Wachapreague Fire Department responded. Melfa Rescue and Painter Fire Company also responded.

Supervisors Get First Look at Proposed Budget

Accomack supervisors eyed a \$56.5 million fiscal 2012-13 county budget plan for the first time Wednesday. The 500-page document was compiled by staff and includes a 7-cent hike in the real-estate tax rate aimed at raising about \$2.2 million in revenue otherwise lost through decreases in housing values.

Chincoteague, which doesn't have a separate tax rate for rescue services, would see a 5.5-cent rate adjustment.

The plan does not include the county Fire Commission's recommendation that Chincoteague be levied an Emergency Medical Services tax to help offset the rest of Accomack's needs. The supervisors said they would address that issue in the next few weeks.

The proposal would set the rate for real estate at 53 cents per \$100 valuation in Atlantic and Pungoteague districts, 55 cents in Greenbackville, 52 cents in Metompkin and Lee districts and at 43.5 cents on Chincoteague.

"Metompkin District will be hit the hardest" for taxes because the property values in that region held up the strongest, said Finance Director Mike Mason. The average home value decreased by about 12 percent. Average district declines were 10.3 percent in Atlantic, 22.5 percent in the Captain's Cove/Greenbackville area, 9.5 percent in Metompkin, 10.5 percent in Lee, 10.7 percent in Pungoteague and 14 percent in Chincoteague.

The supervisors will begin budget deliberations at 5 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 28, in the board room of the Social Ser-

vices Department. The draft operating budget is \$33.4 million or about 3 percent more than the current plan.

The overall draft budget is 2 percent higher than the current budget and includes more than \$7 million to close the southern landfill. It also funds \$16 million requested for Accomack Schools. The rest of the breakdown shows \$840,206 for parks, recreation and culture; \$1,527,000 for planning and community development; about \$5.4 million for debt service; \$3.9 million for general government administration; \$1.45 million for judicial administration; \$9.2 million for public safety; \$6.2 million for health and welfare; \$11.5 million for public works; and \$460,420 for non-departmental expenses.

Nearly 56 percent of the money (\$27.5 million) comes from property taxes, 13.9 percent (\$6.9 million) from other local taxes, 17.8 percent (\$8.8 million) from the state, 4.4 percent (\$2.2 million) from federal aid, \$75,000 from fines and forfeitures, \$106,552 from recovered costs, 6.3 percent (\$3.1 million) from charges for services, 0.7 percent (\$356,558) from

revenue from use of money and property, 0.6 percent (\$312,194) from permits and licenses and nearly \$107,000 from miscellaneous revenues.

County Administrator Steve Miner said \$635,000 from the current budget is included in the draft for solving the county's office space problem. He also included an unspecified amount for a study of shared services with the school system, including human resources.

"Not having HR is a dangerous thing," said Miner. "It helps you avoid litigation. It helps you avoid problems." About four years ago, in a cost-saving move, supervisors eliminated the position of assistant county administrator, which had included human resources.

The plan also comes with \$345,000 in surplus funds. Miner said the board could consider funding a code enforcement officer (eliminated a few years ago), a filing clerk for Circuit Court, a secretary for the commonwealth's attorney's office, \$7,000 in hazardous material requests and additional litter control.

A proposed taxiway for the Wallops Research Park was not in the draft.

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Mother Complains to School Board That Her Son Should Have iPad

A Bloxom mother wants her 13-year-old son to have every advantage, including a computer tablet with applications that help autistic children read, do mathematics, improve their speech and complete occupational therapy.

But, she told Accomack's School Board Tuesday, the division is taking too long to put the 250 "handy little gadgets" that they acquired last September into use or upgrade them with the needed programs.

"There is not one application on those iPads for the special education students," said Connie Burford. "Not one! ... They stay locked up in the library in a cart and teachers have to check out the whole cart in order to use them with the students. It doesn't make sense to check out a cart of 20 iPads for a classroom of 8-10 kids."

Those tablets were purchased with federal funds. Another 20 iPads were bought with local money.

"The county funding should have been used for purchase of applications for the iPads instead of purchasing another toy for the IT department to walk around with," she added.

Burford feels her son would excel

with the tool because he quickly learns video games. "I have volunteered to work with him on the iPad and it was approved," she added.

"They are not toys for my staff," Jim Carey, Accomack Schools coordinator for career and technical education, said later. "They are learning tools. ... We haven't used Apples before."

Carey said 20 iPads were purchased for school technicians to learn so they could then teach instructors how to use them. He said training was held in January. In the meantime, the equipment was inventoried and put in carts to get ready for use at each school. Carey said applications for special education will not be put on the tablets until that department decides what it wants. Carey noted that Burford's son already was provided a laptop computer.

Burford said she had to resort to filing a request through the Freedom of Information Act to get details about the iPads. She wrote to the division on Jan. 31 and received a response on Feb. 6 from Special Education Coordinator Nicole S. Cates, who detailed how many iPads were distributed to each school.

Fire Strikes Homes in Keller, Onancock

Three people were injured Saturday morning in a fire that destroyed their Keller home, according to Assistant Chief Parks Abrams of Melfa Volunteer Fire & Rescue Company.

The blaze was reported at about 6 a.m. at the corner of Center and Pungoteague roads. Nearly 20 firefighters from Melfa, Onley, Painter, Wachapreague and Tasley worked for about 35 minutes to control the fire. Abrams said electrical wires that ignited ceilings in two upstairs rooms caused it.

Haklow Webb, owner of the two-story wood-frame house, was downstairs when he saw smoke and alerted two women, who also lived there but were identified only as being 49 and 22 years old. The three were outside when firefighters arrived, said Abrams. The volunteers remained on the scene for about 2½ hours. Webb was treated on the scene for minor burns, Abrams said. The other two were taken to the hospital and treated for minor burns and smoke inhalation. The assistant chief said the Red Cross is assisting the family.

In another incident, fire was reported at nearly 4 p.m. Friday at 41 North St. in Onancock after a stove was left unattended, said Assistant Chief John Greer of Onancock Volunteer Fire Department.

Units from Onancock, Tasley, Onley and Melfa responded to the two-story wood-frame house. About 18 volunteers were able to contain the fire to the kitchen area, but smoke damage occurred throughout the structure. The occupants and a pet cat got out safely, Greer said.



refuge on a mass transit shuttle," she said. "We have asked our visitors what they think of this idea and more than 80 percent of them said they would not come back ... if they were forced to use mass transit. They like being able to drive to the beach parking lot where they can easily unload their beach gear and spend the day with their family."

"We would like them to work with us to preserve the current beach parking system which has been in place over

the past five decades," said Thornton. "There is nothing wrong with the current system that can't easily be fixed. We would like them to stop proposing to thin the pony herd on the refuge. We would like them to develop a cost-sharing plan for repairing the beach parking lot and stop using the modest amounts it takes to repair the beach parking lot as a red herring for their argument to abandon the beach."

"This is a classic example of an over-reaching, paternalistic federal government imposing its will without regard for the needs, desires, or economic well-being of the people," said Rep. Scott Rigell, who represents the area. "The town, the county and the Virginia House of Delegates have all adopted resolutions disapproving of any effort to expand the boundaries of the refuge within the town to establish a Disney-like transit system. It is unacceptable that the refuge would continue to pursue a plan that has drawn such deep objections. We are regulating ourselves out of prosperity."

By law, the Secretary of the Interior

must prepare a Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP) for the refuge to determine future management of the site.

"The fact that the Fish and Wildlife Service is moving forward with one option, while at the same time telling the public that they are reviewing all options, is certainly contrary to at least the spirit of the National Environmental Policy Act," said Subcommittee Chairman John Fleming.

Art Gallery Owner Nancy Payne was alone in her trust of the FWS. She said the needs of Chincoteague and Assateague islands differ. "One's primary purpose as a national refuge is to protect the wildlife and fragile land mass that is literally at the edge of the Eastern Shore. On Chincoteague, individuals, business owners and private landowners ... and many in the population rely on money generated from the tourists who sleep, eat and shop on our island but go to Assateague for outdoor recreation. Issues arising around these differences can create awkward situations." She favors the shuttle system for emergency use and as an addition to the hundreds of parking spaces. She called the suspicions over-reaching.

"Our island's employers, employees and residents are angry and scared," said S. Scott Chesson, an island hotel owner. "We are angry because our federal government seems to be on a course to turn Chincoteague Island into a ghost town. We are angry because it seems that the current management of the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge has been less than honest and forthcoming. ... The grant award of \$1.5 million came as a shock to us all since we had the assurance that the FWS had no intentions of reducing or eliminating parking at the beach."

"Unfortunately, the business people of Chincoteague ... no longer view the Fish and Wildlife as our partner - they have become an impediment and a threat to our livelihood," said Chesson. "We are scared because a future with limited access to the beach on Assateague Island via a bus service will destroy jobs, diminish property values and close the doors of family owned and operated businesses." He suggested putting an additional 200 parking spots right at the beach with concessions that could be used to raise money to repair any future damage."

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Maddox Campground Responds to Parking Brouhaha

Additional jobs will come with the sale of Maddox Family Campground to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, the owner stated in a letter to a congressional subcommittee Friday. Wayne Maddox also says the loss of taxes would be too insignificant to adversely affect town coffers.

And he contends that Supervisor Wanda Thornton has a conflict of interest as the owner of a competing campground and should remove herself from the issue. He also argued that as an American, his property rights should be respected.

"There is a lot of information being tossed around including facts and figures of how devastating the new Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP at Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge) will be for the economic vitality of Chincoteague," wrote Maddox. "I invite you to ride down to Chincoteague and see what's happening now. Restaurants are closing. Hotels are going out of business and shops are empty. The tourists are not here like they were. People are not traveling to the island like they used to."

"Why you may ask? There is not a clear answer or reason," said Maddox. "One thing is for sure, this downward trend occurred way before we decided to sell our campground. The town will tell you their revenues are up but this is only due to the increase in prices from the businesses."

"Town officials will try and convince the committee that without the campground's tax money the local economy will collapse," Maddox continued. "This year we paid \$3,221.64 in real estate taxes and \$9,291.90 in occupancy tax to the town. This is approximately 0.2% of the \$6.2 million operating budget" for Chincoteague. "We hardly believe our contribution to the town's coffers would collapse the local economy and further, we understand that the federal government provides for this in the form of direct payments to cities and counties when lands are removed from the tax rolls."

"We employ several seasonal and yearly employees," Maddox continued. "We do a vast majority of the work ourselves. If the government does decide to purchase our property, there will be many jobs created. They will not have us to do the work ... this will create

many good, secure jobs."

"The Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge has been very up front with us," he said. "The agency wants to obtain off-site parking for visitor convenience and in emergencies. ... They even asked our permission to keep the family name ... we have no reason to believe otherwise and take the folks ... at their word."

"We realize Ms. Thornton has a public duty to perform but we believe she has a stronger interest in her own financial gain in this particular issue," said Maddox of Thornton's Pine Grove Campground. "We do not see how she can possibly have an objective opinion or position not influenced by her own financial expectations. Since we started losing annual sites, her company has been expanding the business to accommodate ... our loss is definitely Ms. Thornton's business gain."

Thornton regularly meets "with congressmen, senators, our governor and whoever else who will listen in her network of contacts directly linked with her job as supervisor," he continued. "Her goal of self-preservation and

the quest for economic prosperity is a key motivator spearheading this effort. This does not pass the smell test."

Maddox said he is also concerned that Rep. Scott Rigell did not invite the Maddox family to the hearing nor speak with them personally.

According to Maddox, his family loves the island and "donated millions of dollars of property and money," including the museum lot now valued at \$150,000, the chamber lot worth \$450,000 and land where the Curtis Merritt Harbor is located, conservatively worth \$5,000,000.

The campground also hosts the annual Island Oyster Festival. "This money is used to attract tourism and provide information for our visitors," said Maddox. "We just wanted to tell the committee about these donations not for gratification but to show ... the Maddox family has always been very concerned about this community."

"The new campground will surely receive long needed upgrades and enhancements along with a surge of new guests," Maddox wrote. "We can see

new trails being developed connecting the campground to Assateague and maybe even a small visitor's center for all the public to visit. The increased volume of transient folks will dine in local restaurants, shop at local businesses and inject many more dollars in the local community. The notion of selling the campground to CNWR and the town losing revenue is absurd and certainly not a valid argument."

"The most disturbing issue with this whole ordeal is the total lack of property owner's rights," Maddox wrote. "We have never seen so many people from local, state and federal government determined to undermine one of our greatest liberties as Americans. ... The Town of Chincoteague is doing everything in its power to diminish our rights. ... No one from the town... including town planner, town manager, council persons, mayor or district supervisor, has at any point asked for our input or opinion throughout this ordeal. They have never discussed any of the details pertinent to the transaction or showed any direct interest."

Pocomoke City Police

An Accomack teenager waived extradition last week and was taken to nearby Worcester County, Md., where he is being held on \$1 million bond on charges of attempted murder and attempted first-degree assault.

Pocomoke City Police picked up Roderic Rashad Savage, 17, of Leslie Trent Street in Parksley at Accomack District Court on Feb. 16, according to Pocomoke Chief K.D. Sewell.

Savage went willingly to Maryland, was then seen by the commissioner and bond was set. He is being held in Worcester County Detention Center.

William H. Wilson, 33, of Onancock was charged in connection with the same incident with accessory after the statute, handgun on person and handgun in vehicle. Maryland authorities are seeking to extradite him, Sewell said.

Dontrell A. Scarborough, 20, of Atlantic is charged with second-degree assault in the incident. He was "released pending trial," the chief said.

There were no new details regarding

Devin Treye Wessells, 17, of Parks Road in Parksley. He was charged as an adult with attempted first-degree murder and first-degree assault.

Police said an additional suspect is being sought. No identification was provided.

The incident occurred Jan. 28 at the Pocomoke YMCA, where officers were called to an "assault in progress which resulted in a shooting incident" during a birthday party attended by several people from Accomack, Sewell said in January. "No one was injured in the shooting incident," said Sewell.

Northampton Sheriff's Office

Northampton County Sheriff David L. Doughty Jr. reminds citizens to be aware of fraud. "We have had some recent activity regarding telephone and email scams," Doughty said. "Recently ... a citizen ... received a phone call advising that they were the winner of \$3.5 million and a Mercedes. The caller asked them to obtain a prepaid credit card for \$450 to cover administrative costs."

According to Doughty, "Scammers often will ask you to send money for

things such as administrative fees. ... If you are being asked to pay a fee to collect your winnings, you are really not winning. There have also been instances where individuals were asked to send funds to cover emergency medical bills and even jail bonds."

"If you receive a phone call or an email to verify personal information ... please be very cautious. Financial institutions that you correspond with already have this identifying information and will NOT ask you to verify."

The sheriff also advised citizens to "be careful dealing with individuals who may come to your door selling items or service. Please use extreme caution when dealing with individuals trying to give you an on-the-spot deal that 'seems too good to be true.' Often it is."

Accomack Circuit Court

Patrick Allan Seely, 29, of Oceanview Way in Parksley pleaded guilty in Accomack Circuit Court to grand larceny and two counts of petty larceny involving property stolen from Taylor and Fulton April 9, 2011. The case was continued.

According to a statement filed with his plea agreement, Green admitted that from January 2007 through September 2008, he conspired to commit mortgage fraud in the Cape Charles area. He signed loan applications for two properties, falsely claiming a monthly income of \$26,500 and \$24,500, respectively, when in reality he did not earn that amount. For three other properties, he claimed the down payment he provided — from \$55,000 to \$145,000 — was from his own funds, when he knew it came from fellow conspirators. Based on Green's false representations, he was able to secure five mortgages valued at approximately \$2.18 million from various mortgage lenders.

Taxes May Increase

Dear Editor:

Everyone should have received their re-assessment notice and may be relieved that it has declined. Before anyone thinks their taxes are going to be reduced, they need to be aware the taxes they pay might actually increase. The county must receive at least the same amount of property tax revenue just to continue to provide services. The schools, jail, courts, county offices and landfills are some of the services. So, the tax rate will need to be increased by approximately 6 cents to achieve the same amount of money. The assessor has said the average decrease in property value was 12 percent countywide. A few isolated incidents — properties on Chincoteague — did not decline that much. Some properties on the mainland decreased as much as 50 percent.

I have requested the percentage of reduction per district to get a better understanding of this issue. Chincoteague residents can take their new assessment and multiply it by 44 cents and to determine approximately what their taxes will be. The rate today is 38 cents, but the new rate will increase by approximately 6 cents.

Remember, you have the right to appeal if you believe your re-assessment is not accurate.
